I'm Michele Winter, and Hans Heinrich Frey was my 7th GGF by way of Sarah Elizabeth Frey, who married Henry Clowser II, which eventually led to Martha Ann Clowser marrying Josiah W. Cooper, their son John Henry Cooper's birth, and John's venturing out of VA to go to IA, probably to homestead. My mother, Mary Ellen Cooper, came from John Henry Cooper's line. She married a Winter in the Sibley/ Matlock, IA area, and they both moved to California, where I was born, along with two brothers.

I worked with the Dept. of Defense overseas as a teacher for 25 years, retiring in 2015. My husband continues to work for DoD. We met in Wuerzburg, Germany in 2000 and got married 2013 in Denmark, when I turned 60 and my husband 70. It was my first marriage. Prior to marriage I had done quite a lot of traveling, and now my husband and I own a motor home, **wohnmobile**, and we camp all over Europe. 

Kenneth Leon Craig passed away on 5 Jan 2017 at the VA Medical Center in Houston, TX. He was 82 years old. His body has been donated for research to the Baylor College of Science.

Ken was born on 4 Feb 1934 in Silverdale, MO, the only child of Clyde Theola Pruitt and Odell Craig.

Ken served in the Korean War and was stationed in Tokyo, Japan as a medical technician. He joined the Laughlin Clinic in Eagle Lake, TX and worked there until his retirement.

He was an active member in many local organizations, including the Lions' Club and the American Legion. Both Ken and his wife Helen also served as volunteers at the Prairie Edge Museum. Many knew Ken from his having served for many years as an election judge. Ken and Helen lived in Eagle Lake for 57 years.

He is survived by his wife **Helen Louise Frye Craig**, whom he married on 9 Aug 1957 in Cape Girardeau, MO. Also surviving are two brothers-in-law **Dan Frye** (HFFA) of Ft. Myers, FL and **Ralph E. Frye** (HFFA) and his wife **Mart**i (HFFA) of Lafayette, LA. He has many nieces, nephews, and countless friends.

Philip Morgan Friden

1955 - 2016

Phillip M. Friden, Ph.D., 61, of Bedford, Mass. and Cranberry Lake, N.Y. passed away peacefully on December 26, 2016, at Lahey Hospital in Burlington. Known to many as "Phil" but to family and long-time friends as "**Pip**", he was born on December 10, 1955 at East Chicago, Indiana, the son of **James E**. and **E**. **Elizabeth "Betty" Friden**.

After attending grammar schools in Illinois and New York, he was graduated from Palisades High School in Pacific Palisades, California. He received his bachelor's degree in biochemistry and molecular biology from the University of California at Santa Barbara, and his doctorate in biochemistry/molecular biology at SUNY – Stony Brook. He received an NIH Grant to pursue post-doctorate research at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (M.I.T.). It was at Stony Brook that he met his wife, **Dr. Marilyn Francis.** They were married in 1986 at Westbury, Long Island, New York.

He began his career as one of the founding scientists at Alkermes, Inc. in Waltham, where he initiated and led a research team focused on the delivery of therapeutics across the blood-brain barrier. He was then named Vice-President of Research and Development at Periodontix, where he managed a team focused on the development of multiple novel peptidebased treatments for chronic infections.

Following this, he was Vice President of Biology for Scion Pharmaceuticals of Boston, a start-up biotechnology company focused on small molecule drug discovery of ion channel modulators. This led to a position as Vice President of Research & Development and Clinical Operations at Transport Pharmaceuticals in Framingham, which included responsibility for development of all new products, two of which went from concept into clinical testing.

At the time of his passing, he was the Vice President of Research and Development at Benu BioPharma in Natick, where he also oversaw clinical trials of new drugs. He was an inventor on 19 issued U.S. patents and has published more than 50 peer-reviewed papers and book chapters.

Many who knew him as a seasonal resident at Cranberry Lake in New York's Adirondack Mountains were unaware of his vast scientific accomplishments, as he rarely talked about his work. He loved the family camp on Union Point, which he and his brother, **Mark Andrew Friden** (HFFA), inherited when their father passed away in 2000. They made numerous improvements to the property. No matter whether he was in his boat out on the lake, enjoying a picnic lunch at Burnt Rock, hiking to Sliding Rock, or just enjoying time at camp, he was always happiest at Cranberry Lake.

Dr. Friden is survived by his wife Marilyn, daughter Kaitlyn, and brothers Mark Friden and Peter Ford (and wife, Debi). He also is survived by step-brother Charlie Martin, and step-sisters Laura Martin, Julie Miske and Francie Miske. He also leaves three nieces, Erika O'Hearn, Jana Archer and Anne Ford. He is predeceased by his parents (Jim Friden and Betty Friden Martin) and step-parents (Mayfred Miske Friden and Chuck Martin).

Dr. George de Benneville 1703 - 1793

Late this past December I was looking into the **Bertolet** family and came across a very remarkable person, **Dr. George de Benneville, 1703 - 1793.** While we are not directly related to him, he could be considered a "shirt-tail" relation. His wife, **Esther Bertolet** is the sister of **Susannah Sophia Bertolet**, the wife of **Jacob Frey, 1725 - 1770.** (Heinrich —> William —> **Jacob).** Therefore Dr. de Benneville is close, but not part of our extended family. When you hear about Dr. de Benneville, we might want to claim him as "ours" because he had such an interesting life and did some very important things. I don't want to pass off what I'm about to share with you as personal research or scholarship on my part. I'll share what I found on **Find a Grave** that spiked my interest of this man, and then what I found on **Wikipedia**.

First of all, on Find a Grave #13927746 we have the following:

"Theologian and doctor: He was born in England of French Huguenot refugees, the last of 9 children. Both parents died while he was a child and he was taken in by a friend of his mother and his godmother, **Queen Anne of England,** and was later cared for by an uncle. He was sent to sea at the age of 12, when a trip to Africa would change him for life.

"He came back to Europe and began preaching what would later become the **Universalist Faith.** He was arrested in France and narrowly missed beheading for heresy and was granted a pardon by **King Louis XV**, while actually on the executioner's scaffold, due to his noble upbringing.

"He travelled to Germany and Holland before arriving at Philadelphia about 1741 in search of religious freedom. He befriended many Native Americans and eventually produced a "cross-referenced dictionary" of Native American, German and English languages. While with the "Indians", he learned their healing methods through the use of medicinal herbs and plants.

"He moved to Bristol Township, PA in 1757. where he practiced medicine and ran an apothecary in Philadelphia. Although he supported the "colonists", he treated casualties at the **Battle of Germantown** and offered his family burying ground to **Gen. Howe for the burial of Gen. Agnew** and his aide who were killed in the battle.

"He later produced a 140-page book (the **Pennsylvanian Physician**) that is kept at the College of Physicians in Philadelphia. Amongst its pages are notes on the treatment of **Gen. George Washington**.

"He is best known as the **founder of the Universalist Church in America**, and more than a dozen books from 1791 to 2003 make references to Dr. de Benneville."

I hope you can sense my amazement when I read this. Then it got me to check further into his life and I found the following on **Wikipedia**:

"George de Benneville was born in London in 1703 to aristocratic Huguenot French parents in the court of **Queen Anne**.

"While serving as a sailor during his adolescent years, de Benneville traveled around the world and began to question his religion and compare it to other world religions. He shed his Huguenot religion, developed his own ideas about Christianity, and became a preacher while still in his teens.

"De Benneville had a mystical experience and later a near death experience which he described in The Life and Trance of Dr. George De Benneville. These experiences convinced him that Hell is for purification, not punishment, and that, ultimately, all will be united with God. He believed that God is absolutely good and in his love would never condemn any human to eternal damnation. He also preached that each human being has a dualistic nature; the outer, flesh-andblood person is subject to the evils of the world and may choose to do good or to do wrong, while the inner, spirit-like person is crafted by God and is perfect, immaculate, and holy, and cannot be damned. Therefore, all human beings experience salvation.

"Religious authorities in several nations were disturbed by evangelists such as de Benneville, and he was sentenced to death more than once. He preached and practiced medicine in France and Germany.

"After completing medical training in Europe, de Benneville immigrated to the American colonies during the mid-eighteenth century with others seeking religious tolerance.

"He settled in Pennsylvania and worked as a physician and apothecary, using free time to continue his Universalist preaching. De Benneville socialized and traded herbal preparations with Native American groups in the area. His beliefs stressed that all people everywhere are loved by God, and cultures, races, and sexes have no bearing on the worth of a human being. His beliefs stated clearly that the physical body is merely one part of a person.

"George de Benneville died at home in Pennsylvania in 1793."

A Hero from The Greatest Generation; Richard S. Fry:

Story comes from Seeking Family.com

Richard S. Fry graduated from **East Sparta Special School** (Stark County, OH). He also attended **Culver Military Academy** from 1937-40 and **The Ohio State University** until he left to enlist in the United States Army Corps in March, 1942 as a flying cadet.

After his basic training, Fry was promoted to first lieutenant. In August 1943, he was assigned to Pueblo Army Air Base for special combat training to become a B-24 pilot. He later was assigned to the 736 Bomb Squad, 454th Bombardment Group, 15th Air Force as a group leader. He led his group of B-24 Bombers -- as many as 800 pilots -- over Germany, Austria and Romania.

Fry received many commendations and honors for his service to the country, and he made history on Nov. 17, 1944, when he flew "The Joker" on a mission over the Alps. Running out of gas on the way back, he landed the B-24 on the coast of the Adriatic Sea, with minor damage to the plane and without a scratch on any of his crew members. In training, it was said the plane could not be landed with four dead motors, but Fry accomplished the feat.

He was promoted to Captain on Jan. 17, 1945. Just before a leave, Fry volunteered to lead his group on a mission over Vienna, Austria. It was during that mission his group received a direct hit by a German 88 antiaircraft shell to the "Terrible Terry," the name of their aircraft. Five of the 12 crew members parachuted and were captured, and the others were killed and officially listed as killed in action on Feb. 14, 1945. One can only conjecture as to what type of community and business leader this brave, young man would have been had circumstances allowed him to return home.
