Genealogy On the Internet Frey/Frye/Fry's - Lost and Found

Frye Art Museum
Opened to the public in 1952, the Frye Art Museum is the legacy of Charles and Emma Frye, an industrious and civic-minded Seattle pioneer couple. Iowa born Charles Frye raised cattle in Montana before moving to Seattle with his bride in the 1880s. The Fryes prospered due to

Charles's highly successful meat-packing business. With purchase of a single painting in 1893, the couple's passion for art took root. The collection grew over the next four decades. Many of the works were by German artists, reflecting the couple's German heritage. Charles' father was a brick mason from Hanover. In 1940, wishing to keep the collection intact, Charles Frye left the art and his fortune in trust to create a free public art museum for the people of Seattle. See their website at www.fryeart.org

Dick Bell says that Lorrene Blevines, indeed, seems to be a descendant of Heinrich Frey and Benjamin Frey of Fry Fort and Abraham Fry. Lorrene Blevine's father was James Foster Blevines, whose father was Rockwood Blevins, whose father and mother were James R. Blevines and Mary Alma ("Amy") Keeley. Mary Alma Keeley's parents were Isaac Keeley and Julia Eliza Fry.

Dick Bell says that Lorrene Blevines was born May 27, 1931, in Custer, Oklahoma; married Louis C. Awalt (1925-1998); and died September 7, 2005, in Hacienda Heights, California.

Mike Speers found some information about Julia Eliza Fry and Isaac Keely in his records. However, he has been able to identify only one child: Myriam Eva Keeley (1871-1956). He says, "Of course, none of this information tells us how Lorrene Blevines is connected to John Ketcher's mother, Betty Jones."

Obituaries:

Erling Anton Rasmussen passed from this world on Tuesday, October 3, 2017. He was born on January 5, 1924, near Everly, Iowa, to Chris and Mina Rasmussen. He left behind his best friend, his wife Ruth Elwood Rasmussen.



Erling was 93, a Marine, great husband, father, grandfather, and avid Cubs fan who never lost his ability to smile, laugh, and fill the room with warmth. Most of his life was dedicated to helping young people through education, as a coach, teacher, and Dean of Students. In 1988, Erling retired after 38 years of teaching.

Following retirement, Erling and Ruth moved to Fairfield Bay, Arkansas. They lived by the lake, entertained on the lake, and met many, many wonderful friends over the years. Erling continued to love his gardening and wood working. Both Ruth and Erling were very active in the community and their church, Kirk of the Hills. They started the latest journey of their lives on July 15, 2017, when they moved to Mackinaw, Illinois, to be closer to family.

Erling served his country during World War II in the Pacific Theatre. He was a member of the Fourth Marine Division, 25th Regimental Weapons Company, and served in Saipan, Tinian, and Iwo Jima. Following the war, Erling and Ruth were married in Hiawatha, Kansas, 71 years ago.

He was preceded in death by his parents, Chris and Mina Rasmussen;; sister, Eleanor Cook; brother, Norman Rasmussen; father-in-law and mother-in-law, Bill and Alice Elwood; sister-in-law Dorothy Hill; and son-in-law James Causey.

Erling is survived by a family he loved and cherished greatly, including Ruth, sister-in-law Mary Hansen; daughter, Cindy, and her husband, Bob Olmstead, and son, Tony, and his wife, Rita Rasmussen. In addition, Erling had a wonderful family of grandchildren and great-grand-children: Jennifer Johnson (Jeff) and children, Emma and Kaitlyn; Cristy Beccue (Phil) and children, Shianna (Blake), Lily, and Kaleb; Rachel Naramore (Brian) and children, Abbigil and Elizabeth; Michael Rasmussen (Katie); Lois Olmstead and son, Samuel; and Bob B. Olmstead.

Erling's memorial service was held on Saturday, October 7, 2017, at the Haensel Funeral Home in Mackinaw, Illinois, with the Reverend Dave Aanason presiding.

Mary Enid Frye Hough died January 23, 2017, in Tonawanda, New York, at the age of 92. She was the beloved wife of the late Harvey Hough, dear mother of Daniel Hough (Karen) and Martha Barry (Frank), loving grandmother of Kate, Alexander, and Sam, sister of the late Jack Frye (late Helen), aunt of Pamela Schneider and Barbara Frye. Daniel Hough says, "My mother was an enthusiastic member of the Heinrich Frey Family Association and enjoyed her affiliation with the organization."

Jack Willard Frye, 96, of Charles City, Iowa, died Wednesday, August 2, 2017, at the Floyd County Medical Center. Jack was born on February 9, 1921, in Oskaloosa, Iowa, and graduated from Sioux City Central High School in 1939. He attended Grinnell College for undergraduate studies and graduated in 1943. He then enlisted in the United States Army and served in the Signal Corps in China.

Jack returned from China and headed to law school at the University of Iowa. In Iowa City, he crossed paths with a friend from Grinnell, Helen Matthews, who was also returning from service in the U.S. Navy. Helen and Jack were married on June 18, 1949. They enjoyed 64 wonderful years together until Helen's death in 2014.

Jack began practicing law in Charles City, Iowa, in 1948, after graduating from the University of Iowa. He served as County Attorney for about 14 years. In 1973, he was appointed judge for the Iowa District Court for District 2A. He retired in 1989 and continued to serve as a senior judge until 1990. Jack was active in the Charles City Rotary Club for over 50 years.

He is survived by his son, William Matthews Frye (Carol), and his daughter, Barbara Jane Frye (Harlan Petz). He is also survived by four grandchildren: Abby Frye, Julia Frye Odugbesan, Ara Petz (Max), and Ben Vogt (Jeff Albertson). Military Order of the Cootie

My oldest daughter, Rosemary Alice Speers, always has been a success, and many good things have just seemed to happen to her. One of them occurred in an elevator. That's where she met a Cootie.

Before I start this tale, let me inform you of a potential source of confusion. Rosemary is my daughter with my first wife, Jeannette M. Vasek. Things happen in life, and I'm now with a new wife, Rosemary Horvath Speers. Coincidentally, I married a woman with the same name as my daughter. To keep them straight, we call my daughter Rosie and my wife Rose.

When Rosie was a senior in high school, she wrote an essay to enter herself into the Voice of Democracy contest sponsored by

the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW). She won her district contest and qualified to go to the state finals in Columbus, Ohio. We were all invited to the state finals. The district winners were all honored at a wonderful event that included a great prime rib dinner. Rosie did not win at the state level, but that did not change the happiness and pride we felt.

Sometime during the weekend in Columbus, she found herself waiting for the hotel elevator. She always met people well and could engage them in meaningful conversations. That is exactly what happened waiting for that elevator. One of the VFW Lady Auxiliary members introduced herself, and the two of them began a conversation. Rosie impressed this person a great deal and was asked to apply for a scholarship offered by the Military Order of the Cootie. She projected that Rose would be the winner of the scholarship.

The Military Order of the Cootie is described as "The Honor Degree of the VFW. Membership in the MOC is recognition of outstanding service to the VFW and its programs" (Wikipedia). It was explained to us that VFW leaders created this higher level of involvement in VFW activities and service. The members wear very colorful vests that featured a bed bug across their backs.

I have not been in the military, but my father, John Lawrence Speers, was in World War I. He was born in 1900 in Speers, Pennsylvania. Apparently, he stretched the truth when he joined the US Army in 1917 by saying that he was 18½ years old. He was in the 198th Aero Squadron C at Call Field, Wichita Falls, Texas. His rank was Sergeant First Class. He was in the service from December 15, 1917, to January 25, 1919. So he mustered out when he was actually only a few months past 18½ years old. Probably due to the 1970 fire in the National Archives, St. Louis, Missouri, many of his records must have been destroyed. What I've written is about all that I know about his service in World War I.

I did not know my father. He was hospitalized in a Veterans Hospital in Chillicothe, Ohio, sometime around 1948, when I was four years old. He died in 1950. He has never been a part of my life. However, he was the "ticket" we needed for Rosie to apply for the Cootie scholarship in 1986. She won \$1,000 for her first year at Wright State University near Dayton, Ohio. With her other scholarships, this one made her first year basically free for us. Any extra money left in the scholarship account was applied to her

second year. That is when we were surprised to learn that the Cooties awarded her \$2,000 for her sophomore year. We did not know that was going to happen. The VFW Cootie lady from the elevator phoned us and said that Rosie was an exemplary winner of the first scholarship and deserved a second year.

She was majoring in Bio-Medical Engineering at Wright State and was doing very well. When it came time for her junior year, the MOC put \$3,000 more into her account. Again, this was completely unexpected and sure helped our finances as her younger sister, Cheryl Marie Speers, was entering Miami University in Oxford, Ohio. Not having to support Rosie's college costs helped us divert our funds to Cheryl's education.

For Rosemary's senior year, the MOC deposited another \$3,000 into her scholarship account. We were loving the Cooties! They had contributed a total of \$9,000 for her education. She went on to get a Masters in Bio-Med at Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois, and a Ph.D. from the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor.

My father has always been a mystery man to me. It was always strange when I met people who knew my father because I never did. Right now in my life, I know of only one person who still has memories of him. That would be my half-sister, Susan Speers Molyneux of Colorado. However, my father had a wonderful and unexpected part in the education of his granddaughter because of his service in WW I from 1917 to 1919. It would have been great to have actually known him, but through the Military Order of the Cootie, he became an important part of our family. Hooray for the Cooties!
