Corrected Historical Information on Family History in Kentucky

For our 2019 Shelbyville, Kentucky, Reunion, we tentatively have a variety of excursions scheduled—all of which are pertinent to the Fry(e) migration into Kentucky between 1780 and 1800.

Actually, there were at least four migrations of the sons and grandsons of Old Ben into Kentucky. James Fry, son of Old Ben's oldest son, Abraham, arrived in 1787 and settled north of Paris in Bourbon County, along Cooper's Run and across the road from his brother-in-law Jacob Spears. who was famous for developing and producing Bourbon whiskey. John Fry, son of Old Ben's son Jacob Frye and his wife, Molly, went into Lincoln County in Southern Kentucky in 1780 (the year it was created) and helped establish Carpenter's Station near Hustonville. Old Ben's youngest son, William, settled near Bryan's Station (immediately east of the city of Lexington) about 1784. He died there in 1796, and it was his great-grandson Johnny Fry with whom we are all familiar as the first Pony Express rider to head west from

St. Joseph, Missouri, in 1860. Finally, Old Ben's grandson Isaac Fry (son of Benjamin, Jr.) and his wife, Catherine Frye (daughter of Jacob and Molly Frye), migrated into Nelson County in 1800 and then soon afterward into Shelby County. It was there that they encountered the McGees, and both continued on into Missouri as was the case with many of the Fry(e) family members. (In addition, one of our Benjamins arrived at Limestone on the last day of 1784. More work needs to be done here.)

[Note from Marilyn Fry—in copying this report from Jon Frye's email for the February HFFA Newsletter, I left out the sentence about Old Ben's youngest son, William, who was the one who died in 1796. I am sorry about my mistyping of that!]

Diane writes, "I found the HFFA through Heinrich Frey by searching on the Internet. My father and uncle are identical twins, and they didn't know anything about their mother's side of the family because my Grandmother Mary Louise Fry Turner died at the age of 25, when my dad and uncle were 6 weeks old. At three years of age, they were placed in the orphanage in St. Louis, Missouri, so that my Grandfather Clarence Turner could work. He would visit them on weekends. and he took them on trips. My great-grandmother Vere Ford O'Neal Fry didn't like my Grandfather Turner, so after her daughter died, she had nothing to do with my grandfather or the twins, my dad and uncle. It is really sad how there were family members, and none of them would help my grandfather with his very young children. Some of the stories my dad has told me about what he and my uncle went through really hurt



me inside. Later, when the boys were older, my Grandmother Mary Louise Fry Turner's siblings somehow contacted my grandfather. I remember visiting Great Aunt Fern Fry and Great Aunt Maxine Fry and Great Aunt Zelma Fry when I was a child. I never met my Great Grandmother Vere Ford O'Neal Fry; she died in 1969.

"My dad will be 85 in April; my uncle passed away two years ago. What started me searching for ancestors was when my mom was talking about the Indian ancestors in her family. I decided to take a DNA test four years ago, and my dad did his DNA test two years ago. My dad asked me to search for his mother's side of the family, so I kept searching for the Fry, Frye, and Frey family. I got some information from other people on Ancestry. After my dad's results came back, I found a couple cemeteries where some of the ancestors and family members are buried. My dad and my youngest brother took a trip to Southern Missouri and took photographs of the headstones of these family members. To this day, I am still

searching for ancestors and family members for my dad and my mom.

"I have 11 different trees on Ancestry, and I have the Legacy program on my computer. I am related to the Fry/Frye/Frey family, the Bobbit family, the O'Neal or O'Neill family, the Spears or Speers family, the Bradshaw family, and the Froman family and, of course, the Turner family and others. I am the oldest of 7 children, and my parents have

18 grandchildren and 28 great-grandchildren. My parents are still living; they are both veterans and have been married for 66 years."

She is also survived by two brothers, Lester Brown, Jr., of Smithsburg, Maryland, and Donald Brown of Rohersville, Maryland, and numerous nieces and nephews.

The book is *Seeking Signs*, written by Staci Mercado, who is one of our Frey family cousins. Her uncle, Dennis Lee Frey, used to be a member of HFFA. Her maiden name is Frey.

This book is historical fiction. Staci took court testimony and newspaper articles as her base and created a fictional story about the real-life characters and situation. It is a fun and suspenseful read, especially knowing that, when you close the book, you are looking at two of the main characters in the story.

Staci Mercado won a Midwest Book Award for this 2013 novel. Her writing has also been published in various literary reviews and magazines. She teaches creative writing in her local high school as well as in various writing workshops and college classes. Now she has a second book, *Honey Whiskey Murders*, in which she uses the same formula of using an unsolved case



and creating a story around the facts as found in court proceedings and public newspapers. She brings back some of the people found in her first book, enriching their story, and she creates new characters to add their dynamics to the story.

I found her books in my local library. They are also available on Amazon in paperback, Kindle, and Audiobook.




