UNKNOWN AND UNEXPECTED FAMILY ROOTS

I was born in 1975 and did not have the pleasure of meeting my biological father until my late teen years. Overall, mine is a small family compared to some.

I have one half-brother, neither of my uncles on my mother's side of the family had children, and my father's brother has two girls, **Erin** and **Kerri Yanousek** of Collinsville, Illinois, who are also descendants of **Heinrich and Anna Catherine (Levering) Frey**.

My interest in genealogical research and family history began when I realized that I knew very little about my genealogical origins and realized that, although my immediate family is small, there had to be other unknown relations to be found. Having an educational background in paralegal studies and a love for history, writing, research, and the thrill of the hunt, this sort of personal project seemed right up my alley. What I found was not only mostly unknown to me, but some of it was very unexpected.

On my mother's side of the family, I found English, Scottish, and Irish backgrounds that included a heritage rich in pilgrims of the New England area and other founding members of our country. Here, I discovered that we are directly descended from the **Henry Jr. and Priscilla (Lewis) Kinney** (or Kinne) family of Salem, Essex, Massachusetts. **Priscilla Lewis** and her sibling, **Mercy Lewis**, were the sole Lewis family survivors of Indian raids in the Casco Bay, Falmouth, Maine area before migrating to the Massachusetts Bay area. Once in Salem, Massachusetts, both **Henry Kinney** and **Mercy Lewis** were involved, on the accusatory end, in the infamous witch trials of 1692. In addition, I found direct descendancy from **Christopher Comstock**, a trials judge during the Hartford, Connecticut witchcraft trials that preceded those that took place in Salem, Massachusetts, **Deacon Edward Collins** of

Charlestown, Suffolk, Massachusetts who came from England with two brothers and whose Collins family was thought to be part of the "Illuminati 13", DNA-proven descendancy from **Elder William Brewster** of the Mayflower group through my fourth great-grandmother **Melissa Brewster** who married **Sherman Forbes**, the **William and Anne (Busby) Nickerson** family who were co-founders of the Cape Cod (Barnstable), Massachusetts area, the Campbell and Forbes Clans of Scotland, Kiley and Corcoran immigrants from Counties Cork and Mayo, Ireland, a Maryland Quaker and Catholic backgrounds that includes **Elizabeth Gary** who, due to unconventional courtships, was said to have been the "mother of all Talbot, Maryland Quakers", and the Basil Hayden family of St. Mary's Maryland who were distillers of bourbon whiskey and whose "Old Grand Dad" brand is still being sold under the Jim Beam brand of liquors today.

On my father's side of the family, in addition to **Heinrich and Anna Catherine (Levering) Frey** and the much intermingled **Speers family**, I discovered a background that is predominantly Germanic and Central European (Bohemia, Austria-Hungary) in origin. Having always thought of myself in terms of my mother's known cultural heritage, that of the British Isles, to have discovered an unsuspected cultural heritage was interesting to me. Here, I discovered both German and Swiss settlers of Highland, Madison, Illinois and its surrounding towns. Highland, Madison, Illinois, originally known as "Helvetia" or "Little Switzerland", was founded by the **Suppiger** and **Koepfli** families of Switzerland and, at one time, was said to have had one of the highest German and Swiss immigrant populations in the country. I discovered **Nicholas Kile, or Keil**, Constable of nearby Saint Jacob, Madison, Illinois and the auctioneer at the sale of properties to promote Highland's initial growth as a town. I discovered **Jacob Leder**, the grandson of **Johannes Leder**, Johannes who was the fiddle player at Highland's first organized dance. I found **Major Isaac Ferguson**, the first settler of Marine, Madison, Illinois who, according to Wikipedia, was the oldest known enlistee (late 70's) in the Mexican-American War where he died. In addition, I discovered two

"Pennsylvania Dutch", or German, family lines, one being that of our **Heinrich Frey** of Germantown, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and the other being that of **Johann Jacob Sturm, or Storm**, who, along with his brother-in-law **Johann Jacob Brunner**, ultimately founded Schifferstadt, Frederick, Maryland. The Sturm and Brunner families, originally from Schifferstadt, Bavaria, Germany, resided in the Holland, Lancaster, Pennsylvania area for some time prior to migrating to Maryland.

Although what I have presented here is my own basic biography and genealogical origins, it is fascinating to realize that, even though we are all genetically different in so many ways, we are all united still by the existence of two people, who chose to procreate, so long ago. If any one of our ancestors had ceased to exist, then we would have also ceased to exist. I found the Heinrich Frey Family Association through an internet search for my fourth great-grandparents, **James Gilmore and Hannah (McAdams) Anderson**. His known parents, **Robert Gilmore and Rebecca (Fry) Anderson**, were listed on the HFFA descendant index list and, if not for this found information, my search under this branch of my family would have almost surely stopped short. I appreciate the honor of being accepted as a new member in the HFFA where all of us should feel some sense of pride and inquiry over the historical significance of our shared ancestor, Heinrich Frey, and his role in the founding and shaping of the keystone state of Pennsylvania and the role he played in the initial prompting of the immigration of the German people into the United States.

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THE PICTURE ON THE WALL

I have a picture hanging on my wall of my 3rd gr-grandmother, **Hannah McAdams Anderson** and her granddaughter, **Mary Elizabeth**, my gr-grandmother. When I think I'm having a bad day, Hannah reminds me of what could be. When she was just 43 years old, her husband, **James**, died suddenly leaving her with 9 children, the youngest just two years old and with health problems.



James had migrated north, first from Bourbon Co., Kentucky, and then Sparta, White Co., Tennessee, arriving in Madison Co., Il. when he was 13. He married Hannah at 19, served in the Black Hawk War, farmed his land and fathered 10 children. He died suddenly while serving as County Commissioner. According to James's settlement, a majority of his farm equipment, livestock and household items had to be sold to settle his debts.

In Hannah's obituary, 32 years after her husband's death, written by one of her granddaughters, *"She was an affectionate and devoted Mother who was always full of love for her children, ever ready to do all she could for them and to counsel them for good- their welfare being her greatest concern..."* How can you not admire a woman like that?

I have always had a memory of my Grandmother, my Mom's Mom, **Lillie May Sweeney Crump**, working on her family history. She had a table set up with stacks of

books and piles of papers. She lived in a home, a few blocks away from where I grew up in Kirkwood, Mo.

Lillie May and her husband, **Lindell Lloyd Crump**, had their house built after my Grandfather returned home from WWI. They raised 5 children.

My grandmother was born in 1896 to **Nelson Sweeny** and **Mary Elizabeth Stevens**. Nelson Sweeny was a Methodist Episcopal Minister and his job took their family to live in many southern Il. towns. At some point, my grandmother went to live with her grandparents, **Nancy Anderson Stevens** and **Dr. Benjamin Franklin Stevens**, in St. Jacob, Il. My grandmother really loved her grandparents and aunts and uncles who lived in St. Jacob. She continued to visit friends and relatives there for the rest of her life.

Unfortunately, I never went to St. Jacob with my grandmother and never gave a thought to my family history. She died in 1984, and an uncle packed up her research and took it to his house.

A few years ago, 20 plus years after my grandmother's death, I decided to start searching for my Dad's side of the family. He had died in 1977, when I was 18, and my brother and sisters and I knew very little about his family. I had just watched an Oprah show, and ancestry.com had been recommended. I signed up for the 14 day free trial, and wow!, I couldn't believe all of the information out there... I still remember the day that I pulled up a passenger list with my Dad's name on it and a picture of the ship. He was just a little boy and had attended school in England. I called my sister with tears in my eyes. There he was..., and I was officially bitten by the genealogy bug.

So now, skip ahead... St. Jacob, Ill., is one of my favorite places to visit. It's only an hour away from my home, but takes you back to days gone by. Not a lot has changed. The Anderson farm, where Nancy grew up, is still there. Her parents, **James Gilmore Anderson** and **Hannah McAdams**

Anderson are buried in a small cemetery in a pasture on the property..

Dr. Steven's house, where he and Nancy settled after he had returned home from the Civil War, is still there. The same house where they had raised their 5 children and my grandmother had lived and had such fond memories. The Augusta Cemetery is down the road, with the entire Steven's family, along with spouses, as well as many Anderson relatives.

I am now the keeper of my Grandmother's research. I now have the stacks of books and the piles of papers. I have many little scraps of papers and little notes with names with question marks beside them, many in my grandmother's handwriting. She has letters written to unknown relatives, asking how this person and that guy fit onto our family tree.

These bits and pieces have become my treasures and I know that first, she would be so surprised that I'm even interested and second, so happy that her work is being continued.

I have grown to love and admire this family that I am part of. I am grateful for the courage and hard work that lead them forward. I love the hidden stories, secrets and mysteries. I also love this new discovery of my extended family that are also looking for many of the same mysteries. I now know I'm not doing this alone. We're all discovering, and most importantly, remembering our family together.

There's not a day that goes by when I don't want to share a story with my Grandma. I want to ask her if she knew about that... if she knew about the struggles with the Indians... did she know that they had all of those children, married all of their cousins and why did that man leave his wife in one state and move to another??

Somehow, I think she already knows, and is smiling.

4. What is the address of John's farm on Indian Springs Rd? Photos of house of which John built a portion?

5. Where was the location of the Moravian School on the road of the same name in Oley?

The following were not listed on the tour, just happened across them.

6. I came across a Frey Rd near Spies Churches near Oley, within several miles of the Leinbach home. Any family connection?

7. Also saw a Bertolet Mill Rd crossing Rt 73 about 2 miles east of Oley. Any family connection?

Searching Breckenridge

As a young child I remember my father telling me that he was born in Breckenridge, Colorado and that he had an older brother named Guy who died before my dad was born. I also remember my aunt Bebe telling me that her grandmother feared that after she died, everyone would move away from Breckenridge and there would be no one to visit her grave. While my aunt told her grandmother that that would never happen, my aunt went on to say that that was exactly what happened.

It wasn't until I got interested in genealogy about 15 years ago that I came across a picture of my **Uncle Guy** and **great grandmother Simms** grave markers. By this time, all of my Frey relatives had passed on so I had to do my own research. I found a website that had all of the Breckenridge newspapers from the 1880's until about 1910. Thankfully I could search by last names so this job was easier. There were many stories in the newspapers that talked about the parties that everyone had as well as what was on the menu.

For several years **Therese** and I have talked about going to Breckenridge and we finally did this summer. Breckenridge is about a 2 hour drive west of the Denver airport and is located at an elevation of 9600 feet. The gold, and later silver, mining ended in 1930 and by 1933 there were so few people there that the train service was stopped.

Today Breckenridge is a major ski resort in the Rockies. We were told that the main street was not paved until 1970. Now the downtown is all for tourists with shops and restaurants. There are more hotel rooms than you can imagine, they are all over the place and condos are equally plentiful. Even in the summer it is a bustling town. One thing we noticed was that there were no chain stores or restaurants in the town.

I did my research before starting this trip and our first stop in town was the **Valley Brook Cemetery**. We drove all over this thickly forested cemetery in search of G-Grandma's grave. After an hour we gave up and went

out for dinner. When we got back to our hotel room, I went online to findagrave.com where I had previously searched for graves of my ancestors and other relatives at this cemetery. There was a picture of some of the markers I was looking for as well as an e-mail address for the lady who had posted them.

I sent her an e-mail that night and by morning she had replied with a local phone number for me to call. We agreed to meet at the cemetery at 9:30 and earlier that morning she obtained a complete map of the cemetery from the city clerk. Armed with this, we found not only the graves of my G-Grandmother Simms and uncle Guy, but the graves of my grandfather's brother **Xenophon (Zenny) Frey**, his wife and two children. By now I felt that if this was all I discovered on this trip, I would be very happy.

But to my surprise there was more. At 11:00 we went on a walking tour of the old town and got to see some of the store buildings where my grandparents and great grandparents actually used to shop. I had desperately wanted to find the house, or location of the house, that they lived in. I had searched the 1900 census and had street numbers, but the census enumerator had not entered the street names. After lunch, Therese and I drove all of the streets of the old town looking for these numbers. No luck.

I did have, from a 1909 newspaper article, the legal description of the property that my great grandfather Simms sold. While driving around I saw Valley Title Co. and went in. Well the numbers and lots all had new numbers, but, I was given the current street and number. We not only found the location, we think we found the original house, or at least the out buildings. The house has been added on with a new and larger structure in the back. It was for sale so I got the brochure that showed it was totally remodeled. Of course we thought of buying it until we saw the price--\$1,200,000.
