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**MESSAGE FROM THE
PRESIDENT: Charles Burgess**

I am curious as to how many of our members have web sites. Also, I wonder how well the sites are kept up to date. In the past week, I have viewed two web sites that dealt with two allied families that are related to us. Both sites included detailed accounts of our Frey ancestors. To my dismay, both contained many errors plus items given as factual when they are actually suppositions. To top it off, sources given were our own publications, a member's name, and the name of a descendant who is not a member but has corresponded with our membership for years. Unfortunately they didn't give sources for individual items but just as sources in general.

From all of this, you would think there really was a ship called Markus and that Heinrich's father was Heinrich Frey of Heilbron, Germany. Can there be any in our membership who think this is true? If so, can you give me a reason why you think so?

Surprisingly, included in all of this was the baptismal date, listed as the birth date, of 17 June 1663 for Heinrich, which is found in the Sippenbuch of Altenheim (Altheim). Before the discovery of the

Sippenbuch, it was thought Heinrich was born in 1653 though there was no date or age given in the records of his time. The Sippenbuch also gives the names of Heinrich's parents, grandfathers, and his brothers and sister. Yet the two web sites list his brothers and sisters as those given in the fictional letter from Heilbron.

If you ever get a chance to look at Laurel Miller's "Leinbachs in America: The First Five Generations", printed 2002, notice that she gives a source for every person's birth, marriage, death, etc. listed in the family groups. Where a person's name is not certain or a person's spouse is not certain, she says so.

The internet has a wealth of information. However, where I find glaring errors, I tend to distrust everything else that is included.

I once made an impromptu speech at one of our reunions when the arranged speaker failed to appear. I said there was a chance the maiden name of the wife of an ancestor of some of us might be a certain name. I then listed what circumstantial evidence pointed to this, but that I could find no real proof that it was true. I had barely gotten back home when a call from Washington, D.C. came asking if it was true. Ever since I have been constantly trying to convince people that there is no proof and to indicate it that way when they use it in their records. Please be certain that your information is correct and give a source when you can.

NEW ZEALAND TRIP

Wil Frye

In all my traveling while working for a semiconductor company, I never made it across the Equator. The closest was Singapore which is 54 miles north of the Equator. In addition, I always wanted to visit New Zealand. So in February, 2008, along with my daughter Jo-ell and Gary, I was able to do both in one trip.

We are now back from New Zealand, had a great time. Did an afternoon of sailing in Auckland, the city of sails; took an all day motorboat tour of the Bay of Islands; walked a section of the Waipoua Kauri Forest (trees with huge trunks); took the four hour ferry ride from the North Island to the South Island; trekked 11.5 km (took four hours) of the 54 km Abel Tasman rain forest trail; took a helicopter up to the Franz Josef Glacier and spent two hours hiking across it; spent a day on the Milford Sound via ferry followed by the next day doing the same on the Doubtful Sound; watched the bungee jumpers off a 100 foot high bridge outside Queenstown (did not participate); spent a day touring the Royal Albatross Colony nesting area and watching the yellow eye penguins coming in out of the sea on the Otago Peninsula just north of Dunedin; rode the Taieri Gorge Railway south of Dunedin; Took in the South Island Pipe & Drum competition on a Sunday in Dunedin (a town founded by the Scots); went on an all day round trip on the

Scenic Alpine Train between Christchurch on the east coast and Greymouth on the west coast of the South Island; and with a few odds and ends in between - four weeks total. Flew up from Christchurch to Auckland to catch the flight back to San Francisco – nonstop of 12 hours.

Now I can say I have been there, done that, don't need to do it again. The glacier walk was the only thing where I was pushed physically. Lots of up and down ice with stepping across splits. The last 20 minutes I was so exhausted that only with the help of Jo-ell & Gary was I able to make it back to the helicopter pickup point.
