Closest airports: Philadelphia, PA – PHL - 56 miles Harrisburg airport code MDT- 68 miles Reading airport code RDG -16 miles Allentown (Allegiant Air) airport code ABE = 54 miles

The Holiday Inn Morgantown is ready to welcome you! Please call 1-800 HOLIDAY to make your reservation. Group code is HFA (not a typo!). June 10-14, 2015 - \$98 plus 11% tax per night for up to four people per room. Address: 6170 Morgantown Road, Morgantown, PA 19543 – ph 610 286 3000. Wednesday, June 10 - Hotel check-in time is 3 PM. Rooms may be available earlier, on request, when you make the reservation.

Parking is free at The Holiday Inn. McDonalds is adjacent to the parking lot of the hotel and there are several nice, small eateries in close proximity. The Holiday Inn also has an indoor pool!

Meet and Greet - no official gathering – Officer's meeting to be scheduled.

Thursday, June 11 – Speakers (TBD), business meeting, raffle and election of

officers. Morning and afternoon breaks and lunch are included, in our hotel meeting room. Dinner is on your own.

Friday, June 12 – Coach Tour! Beverly Raber has worked out a full day's history tour of family locations involving churches and cemeteries: Bartolet cemetery & Mennonite Meeting House, Heinrich Frey and wife's burial plots, Levering cemetery (Heinrich's in-laws), Germantown Meeting House, exterior visit of Wyck House (at Heinrich's property line) and cemeteries at the following churches: Augustus Lutheran, Jeffersonville Lutheran and the New Apostolic. In between touring, we will enjoy a picnic lunch in Fort Washington State Park.

We end the day with a delicious dinner at the renowned Shady Maple Smorgasbord buffet! Amish cooking at its best! <http://www.shady-maple.com/smorgasbord/>

(**If you opt out of this dinner, subtract \$18 per person from the registration fee and you should follow the bus/self-drive all day. The bus will be touring all day and will go directly to the Shady Maple for dinner.)

Saturday, June 13 - Coach tour! We spend the day immersed in the cultural side of this beautiful region with a narrated tour of the Amish countryside by **Sue Steffy**, daughter of **Jim & Fannie Frey**. Sue has introduced visitors to the Amish and Mennonite way of life for over 15 years. Topics covered will be: Amish family life, customs and culture, educational choices, relationship with technology, agriculture and any other items of interest.

Stops on the tour are: a Burr truss covered bridge, an Amish Country Craft and Quilt Shop, the Mennonite Information Center for the film "Postcards of the Faith", and the Lancaster Mennonite Historical Society exhibit "Decorated & Plain: a Mennonite and Amish Sampler" (<http://lmhs.org/Home/Visit/Exhibits>). Two optional activities are a film entitled "Who are the Amish?" for \$6 pp (<http://www.mennoniteinfoctr.com/who-are-amish.asp>) and a tour of the Biblical Tabernacle Reproduction for \$8 pp. (<http://www.mennoniteinfoctr.com/tabernacle.asp>)

Lunch is on your own in Intercourse, Pennsylvania, a lovely town of shops and

eateries (<http://villageofintercourse.com>). You will be provided with a map and Sue's recommendations for the best spots to visit. You can see jams & jellies made, sample chow chow and pickles, nibble a piece of shoofly pie, finger the quilts, appreciate Amish-made furniture, see the work of Mennonite craftspeople and view art from local artists. At Kitchen Kettle Village you can experience a buggy ride. \$14 per person for a 35 minute ride; reservations required. (<http://www.kitchenkettle.com/members/aaabuggyrides.asp>)

The day ends with us enjoying a traditional home-cooked Amish "wedding dinner" in an Amish home. The feast includes: wedding roast (cooked chicken and stuffing mixed together), meatloaf, mashed potatoes, gravy, creamed celery (an Amish wedding tradition), cooked carrots, pickled red beets, peppered cabbage, applesauce, homemade bread, apple pie, shoofly pie and ice cream. What a delicious and authentic way to end our extended weekend in Morgantown!

Sunday, June 14 – We close our gathering with a church service at 9:15.

How We Got Started in HFFA

We first learned about HFFA when Bob (**Robert Luther Fry, Jr.**) had his DNA tested with Family Tree DNA. HFFA member **Dr. Richard Bell** emailed, saying that he was a cousin since his first cousin was a DNA match to Bob. Dick was the one who told us about HFFA, so Bob joined.

We were really excited to learn about the organization and all the great research that had been done. We have enjoyed meeting many cousins at the reunions.

More recently, daughter **Gretchen**, son-in-law **Cabot Harvey**, and I have had all 23 chromosomes tested at 23andMe. It gives a detailed breakdown of all the countries our ancestors came from--fun! Also, now that the Neanderthal genome has been mapped recently, it can test for that, too, and lets participants know what their percentage of Neanderthal DNA is (almost all Europeans have from 1% to 4% Neanderthal DNA). Gretchen and I are 2.6%; Cabot is 3.3%.

Barry L. Stevenson

1938 - 2015

Mr. Barry L. Stevenson, 76, of 422 West Main Street, Waynesboro, PA died Monday morning, February 2, 2015 in his home.

Born July 9, 1938 in Waynesboro, he was the son of the late Paul H. and Kathryn (Heefner) Stevenson.

He graduated from Waynesboro Area Senior High School with the class of 1956. He later received his Bachelor's Degree from Elizabethtown College in 1960 and his Master's Degree from the University of Michigan in 1961. He also took courses at Stanford University and graduated from the U.S. National War College in 1984, where he taught as a professor from 1984-87.

Mr. Stevenson served as a military policeman with the United States Army from 1961-1963 in both Germany and France.

He and his wife of over 19 years, **Joyce (Brown) Rivera Stevenson**, (HFFA), were married on March 25, 1995 in Smithsburg, MD.

Mr. Stevenson worked with the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency as an Intelligence Officer from 1965 until his retirement as the CIA's Deputy Director of East Asian Analysis in 1997. During his time in the CIA, he was a member of the U.S. Arms Control and European Security delegations to international negotiations, spent time as a Senior Duty Officer at the CIA Operations Center, and also served as a Special Investigator for the CIA Office of the Inspector General. Following his retirement, he worked part time on contract as Director of Central Intelligence Ombudsman for Issues of Politicization of Intelligence.

He was a member of Welty Church of the Brethren, Smithsburg, MD, where he was a Sunday School teacher and chaired the Board of Administration from 2002-2011. He was also a member of the Waynesboro Civil Service Commission for many years. He served as a Trustee at Elizabethtown College, where he chaired the Board of Trustees Academic Affairs Committee.

In addition to his wife, he is survived by one daughter, Dr. Elizabeth Stevenson and her husband, Dr. Chaitan Narsule, of Somerville, MA; one step-son, Dan Rivera and his wife, Norma of Las Vegas, NV; one step-grandson, Danny Rivera; one brother, Paul Stevenson and his wife, Sue of Morgantown, WV; and a number of nieces, nephews, and cousins. In addition to his parents, he was preceded in death by one brother, Bruce Stevenson.

Research the Old-Fashioned Way by Mark Friden

I began genealogical research while in high school, back in the late 1960s, so I have been at it for over forty years. In those years you had to visit libraries, write letters, send away for copies of vital record certificates, tramp through cemeteries, and save all year for that dream trip to Salt Lake City (Family History Library), Fort Wayne (Allen County Public Library), Houston (Clayton Library's genealogy collection, the best on the Gulf Coast), or Boston (NEHGS). I have memories that have become a little fuzzy around the edges of sitting at a microfilm reader for hours and hours on end, hoping to find an ancestor in the census. They are memories of time well-spent, doing things "the old-fashioned way." The thrill of actually finding someone on a microfilm after looking for hours on end, day after day, is unparalleled in today's modern world where so many records are digitized and indexed. Those who have started their genealogy research in the past 25 years do not realize how good they have it.

From the editor: Mark Friden has recently been appointed as the **Clifton Town Historian**. This is in upstate New York. He has also been involved in other projects. He writes:

“Other projects I have completed in 2014 include:

* Co-authoring an article on "Benson Mines and the New York Central Railroad" - this was published in the 4th quarter 2014 issue of "Central Headlight", the annual publication of the New York Central Historical Society (Benson Mines used to be the most important village in the Town and was the site of what was once the largest open-pit iron ore mine in the world; was an important Jones & Laughlin Steel facility from WW2 Defense Plant days through the 1970's - it no longer exists as a village).

* I contributed a small write-up on the Town of Clifton for a hardcover book released in August called "Adirondack 102 Club". It is intended as a "passport and guide to the Adirondacks", in that there are 102 Towns entirely or partially inside the Adirondack "Blue Line" (the Park boundary).

* Completely transcribed and printed out the 1880 Federal Census of my Town.

* Completely transcribed and printed out the 1915 New York State Census of my Town

* Completely inventoried the complete collection of maps we have, and spent tedious months flattening them (There is a nice map cabinet in the History Room, but the previous Historian ROLLED all the maps!!! Maddening!)

* Completely redid the exhibits on display and created museum quality labels for each piece

* Town of Clifton Oral History Project

The Overhiser Story

I have a document about **John Peter and Mary Ann Fry Overhiser** copied below. They are my great-great grandparents.

I don't have the date of the document, but I think it may be in the mid-to-later 1960's since the writer writes of the Victorian home they built: "He built for his own family the large Victorian style house which has been a familiar sight to those who have traveled the Shelbyville Pike the past one hundred years." One of my great aunts has written "The house is still there and occupied."

Anything in italics, I added. Here is their story.

John Peter Overhiser was born November 9, 1828 in Steuben County, New York. In October, 1838, just a few weeks before his tenth birthday, he moved with his parents and his seven brothers and sisters to Fayette County, Indiana. (After the family settled in Indiana, five children were born, making John next to the oldest of thirteen children and the oldest of six boys.) Three years after settling in Fayette County, the family moved to Hancock County, and then to Blackford County in 1845. There the mother died in 1860 (Elizabeth Storms) and the father in 1862 (George Overhiser).

When John was twenty years of age, he accompanied his father on a return trip to New York to visit his father's father (grandfather **John Casper Overhiser**). Soon after arriving in New York, John apprenticed himself to an Englishman living in the community to learn the carpenter trade. His apprenticeship extended over a period of three years at the end of which time he was pronounced "a number one workman". In 1851 he returned to Fayette County, Indiana and began business for himself. From that time until his move to Marion County thirteen years later, he built many of the large houses and barns of Fayette and adjoining counties.

On August 31, 1858 John married **Mary Ann Fry** in her home in Rush County, Indiana two miles west of Falmouth. She was born in this house on June 27, 1840. Mary Ann's and John's parents had come west from

adjoining states, Pennsylvania and New York. Mary Ann's family had come to Indiana in 1833 using both land and water in their travel.

Her family and several families of relatives left Washington County, Pennsylvania in a keel-boat which the families had built. They traveled up the Monongahela River to Pittsburgh where they entered the Ohio River. They reached Cincinnati six weeks after they had left their homes in Pennsylvania. The overland trip of three days from Cincinnati to Rush County was made possible by the use of hired teams.

John had come with his family to Indiana in 1838 in like manner by water and land travel. They had traveled by wagon to Buffalo, by boat across Lake Erie to Sandusky, Ohio, and by wagon to Fayette County. His trip like the one made by the Fry family covered a period of six weeks.

In 1864 Mr. Overhiser purchased eighty acres of land on the Shelbyville Pike from James E. Cunningham at the price of \$40.00 per acre. This acreage adjoined the farm of **Shepler Fry**, Mrs. Overhiser's brother, who had previously moved from Rush County to Marion County. (Mr. Overhiser sold this land with its house and other improvements to Mr. Fry in 1894 for \$5000.00.) Here Mr. Overhiser farmed, and continued his trade as a carpenter, contractor, and builder. He built a number of houses and barns in Franklin Township. He built for his own family the large Victorian style house which has been a familiar sight to those who have traveled the Shelbyville Pike the past one hundred years.

In 1867 Mr. Overhiser built a tile factory on his land and for many years manufactured tile which drained extensive areas of central Indiana, selling to farmers in Marion, Hancock, Shelby, Johnson, and Hendricks Counties. Mr. Overhiser was called to numerous places to supervise the building of tile factories. Another familiar sight to travelers along the Shelbyville Pike has been the small pond surrounded by a wooded grove. In recent years only the cottonwood trees have remained. This pond is the one evidence of a once thriving tile business.

Mr. and Mrs. Overhiser were active in the life of the community, always interested in those projects which seemed to give promise of being beneficial to the community. They were active members of the Big Run Church, at that time known as the Big Run Regular Baptist Church. Even after they moved to Indianapolis, they remained members of the Big Run Church and attended its services until their deaths.

School Number 11, known as the Five Points School, was located on the southeast corner of the Overhiser land. The Grange Hall, the meeting place of this very active farm organization of the late 19th century, was located on the Overhiser farm. A fair was held in the Overhiser woods.

Mr. and Mrs. Overhiser were the parents of six children. **Emory, Viora, and George M.** were born in Rush County. (Emory died the year after the family moved to Franklin Township and is buried in the Big Run Cemetery.) **Eliza, Belle, and Clara** were born in Franklin Township. Two of the children married residents of Franklin Township. **Eliza** married **William Oscar Moore** and **Belle** married **Dr. Edward Montague**. Two of their daughters, **Viora** and **Eliza**, and a future son-in-law, **William Oscar Moore**, were teachers in Franklin Township. Their daughter **Belle** gave music lessons to children of the community.

In 1888 Mr. Overhiser purchased a lot in Indianapolis near Fountain Square, built a house on it, and moved his family there. (His son **George M. Overhiser** and family lived on the farm in Franklin Township for a short time before the farm was sold in 1894.) Mr. Overhiser continued his work as a contractor and builder and as a carpenter. He built houses not only in Indianapolis but continued to build houses in Franklin Township until he was more than eighty years of age. In the later years of his work he traveled to Franklin Township by interurban to the stop on the interurban line nearest the location at which he was building. In a shop he built and equipped on the rear of his lot in Indianapolis he worked as a cabinetmaker.

On August 31, 1908 Mr. and Mrs. Overhiser celebrated their golden wedding. Mrs. Overhiser died the next year, July 24, 1909

(at age 69). Mr. Overhiser lived until Jan. 8, 1925 (at age 96). They are buried in Crown Hill Cemetery in Indianapolis.
